NIGEL HALL

After two years of the pandemic, I couldn't wait to travel back to London, where my son Laurent and I would visit Nigel Hall in his studio. And reality far exceeded my joyful expectations. The variety of the works he had created was overwhelming – so much so that making a selection turned out to be an almost insurmountable task. I would have been thrilled to show every one of them in our exhibition.

The stylistic idiom of Nigel Hall's sculptures has evolved. His circles and ellipses are now presented with a graceful lightness, which, thanks to their careful arrangement in the combination of light and shadow, seem to float in the air and then almost vanish. Equally important to the artist as these sculptures are his two-dimensional works on paper and canvas, which form an independent part of his work, also based on a similarly pared-down design syntax.

In the exhibition "Through Clouds," a selection of Nigel Hall's latest drawings, canvases, and sculptures – some created especially for our gallery space – will ignite a stimulating dialogue as they engage you in an inspiring conversation that develops in the spaces between the playful lightness of form and mass on the one hand and the almost tangible density of the empty space on the other.

My enthusiasm for Nigel Hall's work remains undiminished, as is my gratitude for his enduring friendship. I would like to thank Laurent for his intensive photographic documentation of our studio visit and David Juda for his many years of support and cooperation, which has now led to Nigel's fourth solo exhibition here on Talstrasse in Zurich.

NIGEL HALL

Ich konnte es kaum erwarten, nach zwei Pandemiejahren wieder nach London zu reisen, um Nigel Hall zusammen mit meinem Sohn Laurent in seinem Studio zu besuchen. Meine freudige Erwartung wurde von der Realität bei weitem übertrffen. Die Vielfalt der geschaffenen Werke war überwältigend. Eine Auswahl zu treffen, erwies sich als kaum lösbarer Aufgabe, hätte ich doch am liebsten gleich alle Arbeiten in der Ausstellung gezeigt.

Die Formensprache von Nigel Halls Skulpturen hat sich weiterentwickelt. Die Kreise und Ellipsen präsentieren sich nun mit einer grazilen Leichtigkeit. Durch ihre bedachte Anordnung scheinen sie zu schweben und sich in der Kombination von Licht und Schatten beinahe zu verflüchtigen. Ebenso wichtig wie seine Skulpturen sind dem Künstler auch seine zweidimensionalen Arbeiten auf Papier und Leinwand. Sie bilden einen eigenständigen Teil seines Werkes und bedienen sich einer ähnlich reduzierten Formensprache.

In der Ausstellung „Through Clouds“ treten eine Auswahl von Nigel Halls neuesten Skulpturen – einige davon eigens für unseren Galerienraum geschaffen – Zeichnungen und Leinwandbilder in einen anregenden Dialog. Sie entfachen ein inspirierendes Zwiegespräch, das sich in den Zwischenräumen der spielerischen Leichtigkeit von Form und Masse und der beinahe greifbaren Dichte des leeren Raums entwickelt.

Meine Begeisterung für Nigel Halls Werk ist ungebrochen, ebenso meine Dankbarkeit für seine langwährende Freundschaft. Laurent danke ich herzlich für die intensive fotografische Dokumentation unseres Studiobesuches und David Juda für seine langjährige Unterstützung und Zusammenarbeit, die zur bereits vierten Solo-Ausstellung an der Talstrasse in Zürich geführt hat.

Nigel Hall Through Clouds

"Through Clouds" is the title of the exhibition and also that of the most recent work shown. It is both descriptive of a real spatial event and a metaphor for a state of being as one emerges from a period in life clouded by uncertainty and loss into a world of light and clarity.

It was born of a new experience, a rare and unexpected delight in later years, that of gliding – the art of unpowered flight. New perspectives were revealed and also the tangible feel of the surprisingly solid air; the search for currents of uplift and an almost physical awareness of dropping into the void with a change of temperature. Lost and found is a phrase which comes to mind and seems appropriate.

As with most of my work, titles are important but very seldom descriptive. They are more an indication of where the mind wandered at the inception and during the making process. Sometimes they are only arrived at during a period of contemplation after completion.

Equally important are my two dimensional works, both on paper and canvas. They utilise a similar language to the sculpture but are autonomous works. They imply gravity whilst being free of its constraints. They indicate mass and void and the history of their making often with an intensity of colour set against a deep, sombre black. The colours gleam through clouds of charcoal dust.

Nigel Hall Through Clouds

"Through Clouds" – durch die Wolken – ist der Titel der Ausstellung und auch der Titel der jüngst gezeigten Arbeit. Sie beschreibt ein reales räumliches Ereignis und ist zugleich eine Metapher für einen Seinszustand, in dem man aus einer von Ungewissheit und Verlust getrübten Lebensphase in eine Welt des Lichts und der Klarheit emportritt.

Die aktuellen Werke wurden aus einer neuen Erfahrung geboren, einem seltenen und unerwarteten Vergnügen in späten Jahren, dem Segelfliegen – der Kunst des antriebslosen Fluges. Neue Perspektiven offenbarten sich und auch das greifbare Gefühl der überraschend festen Luft; die Suche nach Auftriebsströmungen und die fast körperliche Wahrnehmung, mit einem Temperaturwechsel ins Leere zu fallen. "Verloren und wieder gefunden" ist ein Ausdruck, der mir in den Sinn kommt und angemessen erscheint.

Wie bei den meisten meiner Arbeiten sind die Titel wichtig, aber nur selten beschreibend. Sie sind eher Hinweise, wohin die Gedanken zu Beginn und während des Entstehungsprozesses schweiften. Manchmal lassen sie sich erst in einer Phase der Kontemplation nach der Fertigstellung eines Werkes finden.

Ebenso wichtig sind meine zweidimensionalen Arbeiten, sowohl auf Papier als auch auf Leinwand. Sie bedienen sich einer ähnlichen Sprache wie die Skulptur, sind aber eigenständige Werke. Sie umfassen die Schwerkraft, sind jedoch frei von ihren Zwängen. Sie verweisen auf Masse und Leere sowie auf die Geschichte ihrer Entstehung, oft mit einer intensiven Farbe, die sich von einem tiefen, düsteren Schwarz abhebt. Diese Farben leuchten durch Wolken von Kohlestaub.

Nigel Hall Through Clouds

Should one just stand reverently before them? When it comes to Nigel Hall's sculptures, that's not the best way to appreciate them. Instead, you must walk all around them, exploring them from every angle. These are works of art brought to life by the experience of movement. They embody the perception of shape-shifting through a change in perspective, as one experiences when walking or driving past a stationary object, and feeling a sense of movement innate within it. A good example of this sensation is his work *Through Clouds*, which gives the exhibition its name. Three large corten steel ellipses, joined one to the other as well as intruding one into the other, seem to change shape with every step you take around them, the way a cloud formation or landscape shifts as you walk by – or in the case of "*Through Clouds*", as you float past, a passenger flying by in a glider.

British artist Nigel Hall has an affinity for this particular shape. "Ellipses are the perfect expression of dynamism and beauty," he says. "And we are surrounded by them, all the time and everywhere. A coffee cup, a coin, the tyre of a car: in actual fact they're all perfectly round. But most of the time, we perceive these things as elliptical shapes, sometimes more rounded, sometimes flatter, depending on the angle we're looking at them from. But the oval is not only a matter of perspective. It's also an integral aspect of the cosmos. The stars and planets move in paths that are oval in shape. We live our entire lives in an elliptical orbit."

The oval in Nigel Hall's work functions as a geometric representation of movement, and it not only applies to his bronze, wood or corten steel sculptures, but also to his works on canvas. In these two-dimensional images, charcoal drawing and acrylic painting are combined to form motifs that seem strict in terms of their formal shape yet at the same time are surprisingly mysterious: an arrangement of circles and ellipses that seem to dance with, and around, each other, like snapshots from the choreography of cosmic movement. And yet despite their cool, reduced

aesthetics, they still leave plenty of room for personal interpretation. For example, a work like *1895/C2 (Mourning Moon)*, with its dominant shape a dark circle accompanied by a faint yellow oval, expresses a real sense of melancholy – and not only because of its title.

Born in 1943, Nigel Hall is one of the best-known contemporary British artists. His works can be found in numerous international museums and private collections, among them the Tate Gallery in London, the Neue Nationalgalerie in Berlin, the National Museum of Art in Osaka, and the Museum of Modern Art in New York. He has been a Lecturer at the Royal College of Art and ran the MA sculpture course at London's respected Chelsea College of Art and Design. In 2003 he was named a member of the Royal Academy of Art. Nigel Hall lives and works today in London.

It is a great honour for us to be able to present Nigel Hall's work here on Talstrasse in Zurich, his fourth solo exhibition at the gallery.

Nigel Hall Through Clouds

Andächtig stehen bleiben? Das ist vor Nigel Halls Skulpturen keine gute Idee. Man sollte sie gehend erkunden. Es sind Arbeiten, die aus der Erfahrung der Bewegung entstanden sind. Sie nehmen die auf Spaziergängen und Autofahrten gemachte Wahrnehmung, wie Objekte sich durch die Veränderung der Perspektive «verformen», in sich auf. Sie tragen die Bewegung in sich. Beispielhaft steht dafür die Arbeit „Through Clouds“, die der Ausstellung ihren Titel gibt: drei grosse Ellipsen aus Cortenstahl, aneinander gefügt, ineinander greifend, scheinen sie sich bei jedem Schritt zu verschieben wie Wolkenformationen oder Landschaften, die an einem Spaziergänger – oder im Falle von „Through Clouds“ – an einem Passagier eines Segelflugzeugs vorbeigleiten.

Der britische Künstler Nigel Hall liebt Ellipsen: „Sie sind der perfekte Ausdruck von Dynamik und Schönheit. Und wir sind immer und überall von ihnen umgeben. Eine Kaffeetasse, eine Münze, ein Autoreifen: sie alle sind eigentlich makellos rund. Meistens aber zeigen sie sich in elliptischen Formen, mal rundlicher, mal flacher, je nachdem aus welchem Blickwinkel man sie betrachtet. Das Oval ist nicht nur eine Frage der Perspektive, es ist auch dem Kosmos eingeschrieben. Sterne und Planeten bewegen sich auf ovalen Bahnen. Wir leben in einem elliptischen Orbit“, sagt Nigel Hall.


Das Oval im Werk von Nigel Hall ist eine geometrisch gefasste Darstellung von Bewegung. Das gilt nicht nur für seine Skulpturen aus Bronze, Holz oder Cortenstahl. Es gilt auch für seine Arbeiten auf Leinwand. In diesen zweidimensionalen Werken verbinden Kohlezeichnung und Acrylmalerei sich zu formal strengen und dabei überraschend geheimnisvollen Motiven. Kreise und Ellipsen in verschiedenen Versionen und Arrangements scheinen auf diesen Bildern miteinander und umeinander zu tanzen. Sie wirken wie Momentaufnahmen aus der Choreografie kosmischer Bewegung – und lassen trotz ihrer kühl reduzierten Ästhetik viel Raum für persönliche Deutungen. Eine

Arbeit wie 1895/C2 (Mourning Moon), die eine dunkel dominierende Kreisform und ein schwaches gelbes Oval zeigt, trägt nicht nur im Titel einen Ausdruck von Melancholie.

Nigel Hall (*1943) gehört zu den renommiertesten britischen Künstlern der Gegenwart. Seine Werke finden sich in zahlreichen internationalen Museen und Privatsammlungen wie der Tate Gallery in London, der Neuen Nationalgalerie, Berlin, dem National Museum of Art, Osaka und dem Museum of Modern Art, New York. Nigel Hall war Dozent am Royal College of Art und Leiter des Fachbereichs für Skulptur am Chelsea College of Art and Design in London. 2003 wurde er zum Mitglied der Royal Academy of Art ernannt. Nigel Hall lebt und arbeitet in London.

Die Galerie freut sich ausserordentlich nun schon die vierte Einzelausstellung von Nigel Hall an der Talstrasse in Zürich präsentieren zu dürfen.




(left) **1901/C** 2021, Charcoal and acrylic on canvas, 50 x 50 cm






1909/C 2021, Charcoal and acrylic on canvas, 76 x 76 cm






Study for One for Tom 2020, Plywood, 33.4 x 29.4 x 8 cm
